1) Paul Roush, you are one of the most prolific trop-rock song writers out there today. Your songs seem so personal to you, but so many of us relate to your lyrics. Where do you find your inspiration?

95% of my songs are about things I've done, places I've been, people I've known, or some combination of these. I find it more difficult to write about things I haven't experienced. I guess you could say that I'm just not that good at making stuff up!

2) Some songwriters need to be in a particular frame of mind or mood to write. What's yours?

I think it's less a "frame of mind" than a "state of inspiration". When that elusive topic finally hits home, I can sit down and try to make something out of it, but I haven't yet mastered the concept of ,"Ok, I guess I'll go write a song".

When I wrote "The Voice", it took a few tries to get the demo down, but for the most part, deep down they're songs that celebrate people, not songs that are meant to emphasize the sadness of them not being in our lives anymore.

4) Have you played Three Sailors for you Dad?

Unfortunately, with the exception of "Fools, Drunks, and Children", all of my songwriting has happened after both of my parents had passed away. But I'm pretty sure they've heard them, and that they approve!

5) Your song I Want to Be Howie is a fan favorite. Tell us how this one came to be. There has got to be a story behind it!

Before I moved to SW Florida, I - like many others - lived vicariously through the pictures and postings of my pal Howard Livingston. One particularly brutal winter day, however, there must have been a photo that made me snap, because I found myself wishing bad things for my friend. I mean who in their right mind would wish for someone to get "big old blister"? The whole thing was rather tongue-in-cheek, and after playing it for Howard, he even agreed to be on the recording, as did Brent Burns.



6) Do you have a favorite song that you wrote, and if so, why is it your favorite?

My favorite ones are probably the most personal ones - "Today's The Day", "Three Sailors", and "The Voice". These are stories that no one else could tell.

7) We want to know a little about Paul Roush, the man. Where do you call

home?

Paula and I currently live on the outskirts of Port Charlotte, FL. about 15 minutes from our favorite beach, Englewood Beach. And while there are countless beautiful places in Florida, we feel that we settled in the perfect little community for us.
